## Get Flowered Up - for only £2

Rob Stephenson reports on the Round Hill in Bloom scheme

D uring National Peat-free Compost Week (16th to 23rd March 2001 – what do you mean, you've never heard of it) we shall be converting a lot of old floorboards into plant holders.

### Peat-free compost

They will come with a peat-free compost filling and a basic planting, ready for you to personalise with your own plants. All this for just £2. The compost is made from garden waste taken by local gardeners to the two Household Waste Sites in Brighton and Hove, and then composted for the Council by KPS Composting Services.

### Better Britain grant

We have enough money from a Shell Better Britain Campaign grant to make 100 planters, but we'd like advance orders from as many households as possible. Just phone or e-mail Rob Stephenson with your details and what sort of planter(s) you require. There will be a trough style, roughly 6" deep and wide by 2 feet long, and a box style 14" high and a foot square.

### Local publicity

The council wants to highlight Peat-

free Compost Week, as part of its public environmental education programme, and have agreed to help by bringing the compost to us. It is likely that we will obtain some local publicity for the event, which may attract new members, and even a few more orders. I hope you will order one or two planters, and I hope that the resulting display will help identify Round Hill as a distinct place in Brighton.

### Any volunteers?

To ensure the planters last for a few years and are as weatherproof as possible (not to mention look even more beautiful) we will be painting the first couple of batches on Saturday April 7th in the garden of Denise Elliott's house at 60 Richmond Road. Any assistance would be appreciated, so if you want to volunteer to help add the finishing touches to a few planters, please feel free to turn up for an hour or two any time between 10am and 4pm.

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

Rob Stephenson invites you - and your kids - to get involved...

At our AGM Phil Beldon spoke about urban wildlife and seemed to get many people enthused about the sightings they had made, in gardens and streets around here.

### Mapping

I wonder if there might be support for a Round Hill survey, model making, mapping, data gathering and practical improvement scheme off the ground during the summer holidays, involving members and their children.

### Richness of habitat

Perhaps we could make images/models of the area at a scale that allows anyone to see the richness of habitat in our backgardens and other open spaces (I favour a topographic model, but maps or photomontage on map base would also work).

### Back gardens

We would have to get our recorders (children and adults) into back gardens and good viewpoints overlooking back gardens by approaching members of the Society, friends and neighbours.

### Record information

We would need to record information about birds, reptiles, amphibians, mammals and insects seen around the area.

### Improvements

A group of young people and adults working together over the summer could distribute leaflets, gather information, complete models and maps, plus photos, and begin to plan improvements such as bird boxes, hedgehog hibernation boxes, new ponds, holes in fences and walls to make it easier for animals to get around, solitary bee dwellings and much more.
