

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
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Advent Windows as at 15th November

Nearest Student Housing? *Coming to Planning soon*

Over 18 months ago people living near the bottom of Richmond Road were informed of a new plan for 87 student room on the old garage site behind Hollingdean Terrace, near Sainsbury's and Richmond House. The scheme is back after a year of quiet, with some alterations. Now with a maximum of five storeys, it fills the triangular site in a series of stepped rises, but still takes away much of our view out to the hills.


The developers all emphasise that purpose built student housing reduces demand for HMOs in the town, but with rents approaching £1000 per month they do not seem to be targeting the same students as those sharing houses amongst us now. Evidence suggests that it is richer foreign students who seek out these purpose built and fully managed properties.



The photograph above tries to indicate the loss of long view the proposed development will cause. The highest part is about the same as the highest part of Diamond Court, the lowest part of which can be seen through the trees on the left of the picture. Students will come and go through a gate in the middle of Hollingdean Terrace, so unless they are noisy, they should have little direct impact on Round Hill.

Apparently new students to the block will have signed an agreement promising not to bring a vehicle into Brighton whilst they live there. Certainly there is only room for one car, and that is for a disabled driver. The block will be staffed from about 9am to 5.30pm or 6pm at an office beside the gated entrance. Outside this time responsibility for keeping order rests with senior student residents who receive cheaper rent for undertaking the duty. The developers say the system works, but personal experience in at least one local family suggests it is not ideal. But this case was with all-British students, who can be a bit wilder – well I was.

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Round Hill Annual Meeting17th October at Richmond House

Pavilions kindly hosted the meeting which was attended by twenty residents plus eight committee members.

Helene, the Manager of Pavilions, outlined the support work for their drug and alcohol recovery programmes. Over 1600 people receive treatment at three locations across the city, and about 60 leave with good outcomes each month.

Barbara (Treasurer) told us that we raised £689 and spent £1100 in the year, the imbalance being accounted for by expensive colour in one Reporter and raised printing costs. The Veolia Environment Fund was suggested as a new source of funding.

We discussed neighbourhood safety; with most saying they feel safe here at any time. Outward signs of a real community may help – get a Love Round Hill window sticker, see front page. The Facebook Community Noticeboard has also helped people be alert to issues.

Two people left the committee; we thank Ted Power and Ray Knight for their valuable input, and welcome Andrew Partington and Jamie Aitchison to the committee – details on back page.

The smells from Veolia's Waste Transfer Station, electric car charging points, street trees and next year's social calendar were all discussed before the meeting ended at 9pm.

But can we plant-up the hollow stump?





There it is – gone. About 110 years in the making, now just a hollow stump remains. The stump will be with us for some time. If the Council removes it then Highways will be required to make good the pavement and road surfaces and reposition the kerbstones. This costs serious money, money the local authority needs to keep for more important services in these days (years) of austerity policy. There are two more hollow stumps and one solid stump along the road. A hollow stump is very much like a planter – now there's an idea.

There may be opportunities to plant more trees. But tree planting does receive mixed responses. Before we press for more trees it would be good to know who favours more, and who is against the idea, especially outside their house.



Hip Hip Hooray - the Roundhill has opened as a proper pub again.

Max and Rosi are the tenants and they have a five year tenancy, but please make use of them straight away, don't delay. On opening night (7th November) there were four, yes four real ales. Wines spirits and Small Batch coffee also available, but beyond that Rosi is proud to offer three different Kombuchas. I have only tasted the one from Brighton creative brewers and fermenters Old Tree before - and it is delicious, a satisfying and complex flavour but just a hint of alcohol. Another local drink producer - Fierce - will soon be providing an exciting tonic for your gin, or even by itself. Instead of refined quinine they use the whole bark of the cinchona tree, the source of natural quinine, plus a bunch of other botanicals they grow themselves. Still not enough choice? Then try any one of their four ginger beers or the regularly changing craft ale.

And when you've got a drink, how about some food? The menu is vegetarian, but can be vegan if you prefer. No meat then, but still serving 'burgers', 'meat balls' and even 'calamari', this one is really trumpet mushroom, and, as Rosi said, it fooled her mum.

Max has been running a Lewes pub for seven years, and they've been looking for a Brighton location since January, deciding on our local in June. They have friends in the area, some will be behind the bar and others providing music. They've done a great job redecorating and adding their own eclectic objects, and soon will be announcing special events. Welcome to Round Hill Max and Rosi (and the two little ones).

More trees wanted

The Upper Lewes Road is unlikely to get new trees in a hurry (see article opposite) but Richmond Road was discussed at the Annual meeting. Some trees were planted there a few years ago, and there is plenty of room for more. At the time the Council seemed happy to provide them, perhaps they can again. But what do people on Richmond Road think?

If you would hate to have a tree planted outside your home on the south side of Richmond Road please tell one of the committee, because we will be seeking more trees — for the cleaner air, bird perches and nest sites, food, shade and sheer delight they provide.

It may be necessary to part-fund the tree-planting this time, but would people be willing to help? Please tell us if you might find a spare £20 upwards.

There is a tree stump on the wide open pavement near our local pub — might this be another potential tree location. If there are other places you think a tree might safely go please tell.

By the way, have you stopped to admire the wall of flowering ivy growing up Sainsburys? Ivy is one of the last nectar sources for bees, and the greenery is usually full of sparrows.

Crime on Round Hill Latest statistics

The Police publish local crime figures, but they are always out of date. Nonetheless here are some numbers for the Round Hill area, bounded by Sylvan Hall, the Ditchling Road petrol station and the Gyratory.

In September most occur near the gyratory (13) or Ditchling Road petrol station (8) with a further 6 near the Upper Lewes Rd. There were just 4 inside Round Hill – anti-social behaviour in Wakefield and Princes Roads, criminal damage in Belton Road and bike theft in Round Hill Crescent.

This ongoing development saga has been upsetting many of the 37 affected immediate neighbours for several years. The latest variation in detail involved more and different windows, with inadequate information in the documentation — just designed to cause upset. Where there was once a business in a cluster of much modified buildings every plan has involved adding more property, more bedrooms, more overlooking and less open green space.

Unfortunately the planning officers favoured the latest changes and recommended approval, and the elected members agreed, some (it seemed to observers) with very little understanding of the issues. The building has been going on for some time and will continue for over a year!

On-street car charging points Coming to Round Hill next year

Fancy an electric car but have no off-street parking? Well the Council is aware of the problem and has received £300,000 from Government to install 200 on-street charging points. The points will be associated with lampposts (but will not threaten our beautiful cast iron standards). We have written to the Council asking to be kept up to date, and they have responded positively, and said if you want one nearby you should say so in an e-mail to electric.vehicles@brighton-hove.gov.uk. They hope to have them ready for use by October 2019.

These are pretty good for letting people know about what has already happened and what is planned in the future. But not everyone wants to be a member of Facebook or regularly checks out the website. Becoming a Friend of Round Hill will provide direct e-mail communication to you whenever activity is planned, ideas are sought or volunteers needed.

What's the idea?

You may not be on the committee, but you may be doing Round Hill related things: e.g. running/ contributing to the website/Facebook group organising a local book or community event campaigns, or you might want to offer your help or advice to inform some of the new ideas that come up. Or you may be prepared to help out sometimes at short notice at community events. If any of the above potentially applies to you, we'd like you to join a dedicated email group. You'd then be sent an advance copy of the committee agenda & resulting minutes, know your help/suggestions/advice regarding all items would be encouraged and act as a sounding board for committee members, especially at short notice for example when the society is contacted by the council regarding a consultation (see page 4). We think it would be a maximum of 2-3 emails each month. We'll abide by new data laws and keep your info safe, not use it for anything else, not pass it to anyone else and you can unsubscribe at any time. You should also know that your e-mail address will not be shared with other Friends of Round Hill you will not be 'putting yourself out there'.

Recycle Right

Advice leaflet for those needing it

Our new A5 leaflet:



It's great you recycle, but do you Recycle Right?



If you put wrong (or dirty) items in your recycling box you are **NOT** recycling them. You may also find City Clean does not empty your box. Even if they do take your waste, too many wrong or dirty items (just 10%) and it all gets burnt. We want to avoid this.

Please check what BHCC recycles in the list below and let's all ensure we recycle right





PLASTIC BOTTLES ONLY! Ask yourself, is it plastic, is it a bottle?

If your answer is yes and yes - wash it and squash it - NO LIDS.



Any paper. Envelopes including windows, flyers, newspapers, directories.

Cardboard Boxes - remove self-adhesive tape.



Check for recycling symbol on packaging.

Cut to roughly magazine size (A4).



Food and drinks cans - rinsed Empty aerosols - NO LIDS



Bottles and jars - NO LIDS Wash and put out in a SEPARATE BOX



In a clear bag on top of or near your box or bin.



Wrong

IF IT'S NOT A BOTTLE DO NOT PUT IT IN YOUR RECYCLING! Even if it has a recycling symbol.

No tubs, no trays, NOTHING.

No paper and greeting cards with foil or glitter.

NO CARTONS (tetra pack) OR
COFFEE CUPS – they look like
cardboard but contain plastic.
Some other cardboard looking
packaging has plastic.
IF YOU ARE NOT SURE - CHECK FOR
A RECYCLING SYMBOL

No greasy items - such as pizza boxes No tubes of puree or toothpaste No metal lids

No random bits of glass No broken glass

Walking round the streets of Round Hill it is common to see uncollected black boxes of recycling. Sometimes these boxes have been left by the recycling crew because the mix is not what they want. It's good that people want to recycle, but it would be a great deal better if they did it right. And that is where our new leaflet comes in. It offers easy to grasp information on how to use the Council black boxes.

Committee members will soon be delivering them through letterboxes of houses where the recycling box is clearly being misused, but if you want to help a neighbour with advice then you will soon be able to download a copy of this leaflet and print out a few copies.
