Monkey Business

When Bonnie Scovell, our Police Community Support Officer, attended our AGM in 2010 she mentioned that she was local, and attended the Downs School. Later she told me that her Dad would ask her, as they passed the end of Roundhill Road, 'Can you see the monkey?'. Bonnie said that she often saw it, in a cage on a platform above a garden. It was some time before she met someone who could confirm this childhood memory.



A long-term resident, who prefers to remain anonymous, recalled, 'I first saw the chimpanzee in 1961 or 62, when I moved here. It sat hunched in its misery staring fixedly down Roundhill Road, completely without protection from the elements and with no sign of bedding of any kind. Its eyes reflected the hopelessness of its situation and they have haunted me to this day. I have since heard that children would taunt it on their way home from school and it would return the missiles that landed in its cage. I have no idea of its fate - it just wasn't there one day. I still reproach myself for not reporting it to the authorities.' Does anyone know any more? (Thanks to Stefan Holmstrom for the image)




A Safe Crossing on the Upper Lewes Road?

Last year it was worse, and on many occasions I complained to the manager of the site and also to the Environment Agency, who grant Veolia a licence.

It is a good idea to keep a log of your calls as evidence, with headings across the top of a page in a permanent diary labelled 'date', 'incident and time', 'who contacted' and 'outcome'. If the problems persist this record could be valuable evidence.

Did you know that Round Hill has an active online community, via an email list? The volume of mails ebbs and flows but in the last few months there has been lively discussion about the concept of a CPZ, requests and responses for information about cleaners, gardeners, painters and plumbers, offers of plants and furniture to give away, discussion about neighbourhood security and about problems with noisy neighbours.

It's easy to join - send an email to roundhillsubscribe@yahoogroups.com outlining where you live in Round Hill - this is simply so we can keep the group locally focused and avoid spammers joining the list. You can control your own settings to either receive each email individually or a daily or weekly digest of mails. The volume of mails isn't high - an average of about 10 per month. A fable for our times

A few years ago my neighbour decided to have a free water meter fitted. He lives on his own so thought it ought to be easy to save money with a meter rather than paying on the basis of his rateable value.

Round Hill AGM

Summary of the Meeting

About 28 people attended the meeting held for the first time in the upstairs room of the new Roundhill Tavern. There were some significant committee changes, with Marian Gerrett stepping down from the committee, leaving a vacancy for treasurer, which was ably picked up by Carol Hall.

Marian has been on the committee since the beginning and stepped down only because she plans to leave Round Hill for the delights of Shoreham.

Three new committee members stepped forward, Jenny Tear and Boo Vaughan, both living on Princes Road, and Deborah French, Chair of the newly formed residents group at Mayo Court.

The street party made a tiny surplus (£57) only through the generosity of local businesses D'Aubigny Fusions and Magnetic Events, without them we would have lost well over £1000. The Council also gave us £1000 towards the event.

Overall we had an income of £7575 and expenditure of £4964. The Community University Partnership Project provided £2491, and the project is still ongoing.

The weather spoilt the street party and led to the cancellation of the seasonal singing last year, but, on the up side Carelets lost their appeal to the Planning Inspectorate largely because of the huge efforts made by a handful of residents who carried out several traffic surveys which convinced the Inspector that there is no spare space for a big Carelets development. **Continued on page 7**

Nearby Planning Proposals Applications in the pipeline

Pete West and Lizzie Dean, two of our Councillors attended our Annual General Meeting in September and spoke about planning applications and developments which might have an impact on people living in the Round Hill area.

The Preston Barracks site, on the Lewes Road, is being considered by the University of Brighton as a possible site for housing 750 students, as well as about 300 homes and some retail. One hope is that more student housing will reduce the demand for rented housing in town, so that more may become available for families here. Landlords like housing students partly because student households pay no Council Tax.

Meanwhile the old Co-operative store on the London Road may be demolished and replaced by ground floor retail topped by several floors of student accommodation specifically for foreign students studying at the University of Sussex. Presumably the University thinks secure purpose-built in-town housing will help attract valuable foreign students who pay fees substantially higher than UK students.

Just down the road from the Co-op, the Open Market seems finally ready to start work on a complete new build, all new stalls on two floors under cover, funded by a substantial number of social housing units down the Francis Street side of the site.

In the discussion period smells from the Refuse Transfer Station and car parking issues featured highly.

The petition run by those in favour of another CPZ consultation sems to have worked as it has recently been reported that Round Hill will be consulted again in 2013/14.

The Councillors raised a number of issues (see above) including the creation of 'special stress areas' to act between Cumulative Impact Zones and other parts of the town where booze licences are usually granted. Cllr Dean urged us to object to applications for drinks licences if we feel there are too many already. Without objections they will be granted.

Afterwards we ate some excellent snacks prepared by the pub and enjoyed half an hour of songs from Cocktail Party.
