Round Hill's Alternative to Crufts

In Round Hill, thanks to the boundless enthusiasm of Jan Curry, our second (Fun) Round Hill Dog Show was a great success. Dogs of all sizes and pedigrees competed in a wide range of both challenging and hilarious categories: Bad Hair Day; Shiniest Coat; Best Trick; Musical Sits; Temptation Alley; Most Fabulous Fella; Most Beautiful Bitch; Best Paw Shaker and Musical Statues.

Temptation Alley, in which dogs had to show that they could resist successive plates of sausages, was perhaps the biggest challenge with several dogs driven to delicious distraction by the first plate and only a couple getting to the end without succumbing. The children with their toy dogs had a big advantage here and, along with a super-cool lurcher, swept up the winners' rosettes.

Musical Statues, in which dogs and owners had to remain still for a minute once the music stopped, was increasingly comic as the 60 seconds slowly ticked by.

This year the prizes move up market - dog poo bags gave way to several £20 vouchers, dog collars and dog treats, generously donated by local pet shops .The humble sausage prize, however, remained a favourite with the dogs themselves - especially the vegan dog , whose owners were thankfully very broad-minded!

Another new feature was the raffle, with many good prizes provided by the pet shops .Ironically, the top prize, a beautifully created basket of doggy items, was won by Dom who doesn't have a dog! Problem solved by Dom distributing the contents to those who did!

The occasion certainly lived up to its claim to be a fun dog show, let's hope it happens again.

Check you get planning permission

Before you spend your money.


One of the many reasons that Round Hill is such a popular place to live, is the special unspoilt character of and history of our local architecture. This is recognised and described in Round Hills's conservation statement. However along with conservation status comes the responsibility for all of us to protect and improve our architecture.

Recently there have been several 'improvements' to made to houses without owners first gaining the legally required planning permission. Unfortunately for them, when they applied for retrospective permission they found they had to remove all their unlawful alterations and replace them with designs and materials that met with conservation planning requirements. Brand new UPVC front doors and windows were all torn out and replaced for a second time with wooden doors and sliding sash windows, no doubt costing much more than if guidance and permission had been sought first.

The special characteristics of Round Hill have extra protection through an Article 4 Directive which states "In order to halt the erosion of features such as sliding sash windows and traditional materials that was threatening to harm the special character of this conservation area, an additional planning control known as Article 4 was brought in. This requires owners to apply for planning permission to carry out works that were previously 'permitted development'. This means that the alteration or replacement of all windows, doors or roofs fronting a highway or open space, and the demolition or alteration of chimneys, all needs planning permission."

Don't get caught out. The Round Hill Society has written to all local Managing Agents to remind them of their responsibilities.

We need council permission - by the time you read this we'll have met with City Parks Head of Operations and may know whether we have a "green light". Until we get a decision our plans are speculative, but here's what we'd like to do, with YOUR support and help.

The sites:

Ditchling Road southbound bus stop.

How about a safer space with raised planting and seating to deter pavement parking? We could add in something fun for children – something to play on like mini outdoor gym bars or a curly path? We have many ideas and would welcome more. We're excited to be meeting the head of B&H Buses in September to discuss having a bee-friendly, green roofed bus shelter.

We've started an online petition to narrow this junction, making it safer for pedestrians and keeping cars on the correct side of the road when turning into Crescent Road. We could use the extra pavement for small flowerbeds or maybe a tree. Do you agree? If so, sign the petition on Brighton and Hove council's website by 7 October (search petitions and "narrowing Crescent Road"). There'll be a paper petition soon. If you disagree, it would be helpful to know your concerns.

Richmond Road/Mayo Road junction.

We could increase the planting here and incorporate seating, a community noticeboard, bug hotel, children's little library (see the lovely one in Norfolk Square). The list is (almost) endless.

If permitted, we'll apply to charities and organisations for funding for the structures/planting and hold fund-raising events, but we hope our community will join in and offer their skills free to help make this happen.

In the next few months we'll put up displays to show how these pocket parks could look. We hope you'll get involved and share your ideas and/or concerns. We're interested to talk to garden designers; gardeners; carpenters; builders; anyone happy to pitch in and give their time free for the community. Once up and running we'd love to form a volunteer "gardening crew" to regularly maintain our new spaces. Those not so able might come along to sit, watch, chat and encourage! More news to come.....

Jewellery-making classes

Something new at the Roundhill

We all know you can get good beer and great food at the Roundhill. Then there are the events nights: Quiz, Folk, Boogie-Woogie and Cabaret. Now there is the chance to get creative and make a lovely sterling silver ring yourself at the Jewellery Making workshops run by Alice Ashton.

I decided to treat myself to the workshop Alice ran on Monday the 12th August. No previous experience is needed, I certainly didn't have any, just lots of enthusiasm and an idea or two. Alice started the session by talking us through the equipment we would be using and explaining how the lost wax casting technique is used to cast our final designs. It was a lovely relaxing day, although a little apprehensive about my skills, I was soon carving, filing and shaping my wax with some skill. We took a break for a lovely two course lunch and then completed our pieces ready for Alice to take away, cast and polish. Can't wait to see how my finished ring will look.

If you are looking to treat yourself, then this is a great present for yourself or someone special. It is fun, relaxing, a chance to meet new people and you discover creative talents you didn't know you had. The cost (about 70 pounds) includes use of equipment, wax for carving, silver casting, polishing and delivery of your finished piece and of course a delicious two course lunch. The class starts at a civilised 11am and finishes around 3pm, with a maximum of 8 people per class.

Crime on Round Hill

Latest statistics

Here are the latest figures for the Round Hill area, including Sylvan Hall, bounded by the Ditchling Road, the railway line, the gyratory and the Upper Lewes Road.

April's large number contains 10 crimes at the Gyratory including carrying a weapon, vehicle crime, anti-social behaviour, shoplifting and theft. A further 6 (theft, violence and shoplifting) happened at the BP petrol station on Ditchling Road. These are usually our 2 crime-dense locations. There were also 8 crimes reported on Sylvan Hall. Perhaps of most direct relevance the core streets of Round Hill (Mayo, D'Aubigny, Ashdown, Richmond and Round Hill Crescent) reported 11 crimes being 5 Anti-social behaviour, 5 violent crime and 1 Criminal damage - a bad month.

May's hotspots were the Gyratory 4, the BP station 4, Sylvan Hall 5 and the Upper Lewes Rd 4.

June saw 10 crimes at or near Round Hill Crescent – mainly public order issues. Whilst the drugs and weapons incidents were on the fringes of Round Hill.
