TOAD PATROL



In February and March, our local Round Hill toads, frogs and newts come out of hibernation and make their way to their breeding ponds. The migration via the Cat's Creep is an annual phenomenon, with the steps officially recognised as a toad crossing.

As this is such an important event, Round Hill amphibian fans count the toads, newts and frogs on the Cat's Creep during the migration to monitor numbers.

TOAD PATROL



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Every year the Round Hillers identify fluctuations and trends in the amphibians' behaviours and populations. For example, last year frog numbers leapt up but toad numbers went down. We do not yet know the reason for this but will keep monitoring to see if the trend continues.

In addition to recording amphibian numbers, we report on the significance of ambient and environmental changes, such as rainfall and temperature. We send all the information we gather to national databases.

Would you like to learn more about amphibian behaviour? Or just join a local community-run project? Join the Cat's Creep 'toad patrol' with your neighbours! It involves no more than 20 minutes of patrolling on any night(s) you're available across February and March.

NEW BLUE PLAQUE



A new plaque has been unveiled on Ravilious House, the new student housing block on the corner of Caledonian and Lewes roads. It commemorates those killed by enemy bombs on 20th September, 1940, during World War II.



Five people died in the bombing of the Lewes Road Inn, including the pub's landlord and his wife, Ernest and Rosina Sully, Sgt James Frew (who was due to rejoin the Sussex Regiment the following day), John Watson who was cleaning the windows, and Violet Pullen.

A further 13 people died in Caledonian Road. The pub site remained derelict until the current one opened in September 1957.

During the war, 476 bombs fell on Brighton & Hove in 83 separate air raids, killing 227 people and seriously injuring a further 410. Bombs destroyed 280 properties and seriously damaged 1028.

LOCAL CRIME UPDATE



According to local residents, there was a spate of plant thefts from outside people's houses across the last few months. There were also car break-ins for theft only, where perpetrators bypassed the electronic locking systems. Several residents reported witnessing drug use and dealing in a few hotspots, such as the Esso garage, the Cat's Creep and Mayo Road.

Our local Police Community Support Officer (PCSO), Benjamin Drewswood, has said the police were unaware of many of these crimes, as they had not been widely reported until more recently. He encourages local residents to keep reporting all incidents they witness to the police, as then they can send officers to patrol certain areas more regularly, including plain clothes police officers to prevent drug use in public and drug dealing.

At the Round Hill Society Annual Community Meeting, PCSO Drewswood was otherwise pleased to confirm that the Round Hill area is one of the safest areas of Brighton & Hove, with little crime.


MESSAGE FROM YOUR COUNCILLORS

ROUND HILL HISTORY



As a Round Hill resident, you are lucky to live in a vibrant social, historical and architectural area of Brighton; a wonderful community built on strong local working-class roots.

Initially, Round Hill was planned to appeal to monied visitors to Brighton and was designed to be viewed from Race Course Hill. However, many of the people living in Round Hill provided food, washing and other vital services to Brighton. Every street has its own special story to tell, whether it be its architecture, interesting people who lived there or the work that employed local residents.

Round Hill was designated a Conservation Area in 1977. A 'Character Statement', created by the Council, supports our Conservation Status and is used to inform new plans for our area. Best practice is to update Character Statements every five years but major cuts to local authorities mean this has not been done since 2005. So to protect our lovely community from inappropriate future developments, a group of local residents are writing our own updated 'Statement' to submit to the Council for adoption.

Ideally, every street in Round Hill would have its own history written up and informed by those who live there, including everything they can find out from local archeology, architecture or social history. From these 'street gazetteers', an overarching 'Round Hill Conservation Statement' will be written. When adopted by the Council, this will inform all future planning applications in Round Hill. And everyone in Round Hill can be part of finding out about their local history!
